CAREER BRIEF

(Grades 3-5) University

You have seen Career Sparks Encounters and learned about jobs you can have when you grow up. Now it's time to learn about how going to a university or college can help you get that dream job.

WHAT IS A UNIVERSITY?

- A university is a school you go to after you finish high school to continue learning.
- Colleges are similar to universities, but are usually smaller.

WHY DO YOU GO TO A UNIVERSITY?

- At a university, you choose what subject you want to study.
- Here are some subjects you can study at a university: computer science, biology, psychology, history, mathematics, engineering, English, business, nursing (This only shows just a few. There are many more to choose from).
- After taking 4-5 years of classes in the subject you want to study, you become an expert and earn a degree in that subject. This is called a Bachelor's Degree.
- You can continue your education at a university after your Bachelor's Degree. You would attend a Graduate Program at a university.

Fun Fact: "University" is a shortening of the Latin universitas magistrorum et scholarium or "a community of masters and scholars."

EDUCATION AND TRAINING: DEGREES YOU CAN EARN AT A UNIVERSITY

- Bachelor's Degree: After about 4 years of studying a subject at the university level, you receive a Bachelor's Degree.
- Master's Degree: After earning your Bachelor's Degree, you can attend 2 more years of school in the subject of your choice. After you complete the 2 or more years of school, you earn a Master's Degree.
- Doctoral Degree: To earn a doctoral degree, you attend another 4-6 years of schooling at the university level to specialize in a subject. After your 4-6 years of schooling, you earn a Doctorate.

SKILLS

- You must be responsible and complete your schoolwork and study hard.
- You must be flexible and adjust to your new university, which is bigger than your high school.
- You must set goals for yourself and work to achieve them.
