WHAT IS A SURGEON?

 A surgeon is a doctor of medicine that specializes in performing surgeries to treat injuries, diseases, or illness. Surgeons usually specialize in operating on a particular part of the body.

WHAT DO SURGEONS DO?

- Operate on broken bones, remove and replace body organs, repair body systems and other medical procedures on parts of the body
- They lead the team of medical workers and nurses in the operating room, where surgeries are performed
- Study a patient's medical history
- Order tests that help to identify the problem with a patient
- Figure out a patient's medical needs
- Check out a patient to see if they are healthy enough for surgery
- Monitor a patient and how they are recovering from their surgery
- Use medical tools to perform surgery

Fun Fact: The earliest written record that mentions the practice of medicine is Hammurabi's Code from the 18th century BC in Mesopotamia.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- Graduate from college with a bachelor's degree in any subject.
- Take the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT)
- Attend and complete a medical school program (usually 4 years)
- A 5 year surgical residency (work with someone that is already a surgeon and learn from them)

SKILLS

- Communication Skills: must communicate with patients and other medical professionals before, during and after surgery
- Leadership Skills: be able to lead and manage a room full of medical staff during surgery
- Stress Management: must have good stress management skills/ must be able to handle the pressure of operating on patients, especially in emergency situations
- Detail-Oriented: be able to pay attention to details over a long period of time/ surgeons often spend hours operating on patients
- Problem-Solving Skills: look at a patient's symptoms, injuries and needs to figure out how to help them
- Quick Decision Making: figure out quickly how to deal with any issues or problems that may come up during before, during or after surgery
- Be Available: surgeons are often called to come to the hospital, even on their days off, so their schedules can be demanding

FAMILY MEDICINE DOCTOR



WHAT IS A FAMILY MEDICINE DOCTOR?

 A family medicine doctor specializes in taking care of people of all age ranges. They meet with people of all ages to make sure they are healthy.

WHAT DO FAMILY MEDICINE DOCTORS DO?

- Check in with patients to make sure they are healthy
- Figure out why patients are sick and how to help them
- Provide immunizations (vaccines and shots that protects against diseases)
- Educate patients about how they can avoid getting sick and how they can live a healthy lifestyle
- Write prescriptions for medicines patients need

Fun Fact: Nearly half of all medical school graduates are women. This is up 30% from over thirty years ago.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

- Graduate from college and earn a bachelor's degree in any subject. Many family medicine doctors major in pre-medical subjects such as biology, physics, and chemistry
- Take a special test for doctors called the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT)
- Attend and complete a medical school program (usually 4 years)
- Complete an internship and residency, which is when they train with someone who is already a doctor and learn from them (usually 2-4 years)

SKILLS

- Be able to communicate with patients and other medical professionals
- Use their medical knowledge and experience to help their patients
- Look at a patient's symptoms, injuries, needs, and choose the right treatment
- Build a relationship with their patients because family medicine doctors are often the first people patients reach out to when they need help
- Use their computer skills to put in patient information and look up patient information
